

Who were the Conquistadors?

'Conquistador' aka Conqueror

- Often times Spanish sailors, Castholic missionaries, with a majority being lower class citizens who wanted to make a name for themselves or receive a royal title.
- NOT ALWAYS Spanish! Many other European explorers became conquistadors after getting investments from Spain to work hand in hand with the Spanish. Examples include Pedro De Candida (Greek artilleryman) and Ambrosius Ehinger (German).

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Conquistadors Purpose

- The goal for every Conquistador (made up over over 10,000 men) was to explore and conquer new land for Spain.
- Along with land, resources were a great desire for the Conquistadors as they were placed with a ton of debt after gathering many Spanish investors to fund their exploration. Gold was a need!

Equipment of a Conquistador!

- The equipment was impressive to say the least. With steel amor, steel weapons, and many designs. The natives with only very primitive weapons were unable to penetrate the Conquistadors steel armor in most battles.
- Conquering other lands meant bringing power and honor to the Spanish Monarchy. However, it often involves force and violence since it generally ends in war.
- Many Conquistadors added to history by conquering and establishing what is the USA today.

Juan de Oñate statue: Last Conquistador

Located in El Paso International Airport, Texas

It was meant as a sign of recognition and celebration of the centuries-old Hispanic presence in (what is now) the USA.

The statue was heavily criticized when the Acoma Pueblo of El Paso informs the City Council of the barbaric treatment their group received at the hands of the so-called Last Conquistador.



Social Justice
