<u>**Critical Race Theory</u>**- Critical race theory is a theoretical framework in the social sciences that examines society and culture as they relate to categorizations of race, law, and power.</u>

<u>**Culture Identity theory</u>**- Cultural identity refers to a person's sense of belonging to a particular culture or group. This process involves learning about and accepting traditions, heritage, language, religion, ancestry, aesthetics, thinking patterns, and social structures of a culture</u>

<u>Social Justice</u>- Judgments about what is "just," "fair," "deserved," or someone is entitled to receive are a central social judgment lying at the heart of people's feelings, attitudes, and behaviors in their interactions with others

<u>Semiotics</u>- was founded by Ferdinand de Saussure by expanded on by Roland Barthes. The goal of semiotics is interpreting both verbal and nonverbal signs

<u>Myth</u>- The connotative meaning that signs carry wherever they go. This idea of myth makes what is cultural seem natural.

Sign- Something that stands in for something else

Signifier- is called the signifier because it creates meaning

Signified – The idea the person is communicating is trying to invoke

Deconstruction-The process of unmasking contradictions within a text; debunking

Denotative sign system-A descriptive sign without ideological content. Denotative system which is strictly descriptive.

<u>Connotative sign system</u>- Connotative system which is based on connotation. This means that a neutral sign can become an ideological tool. The original meaning is not lost but it change
